

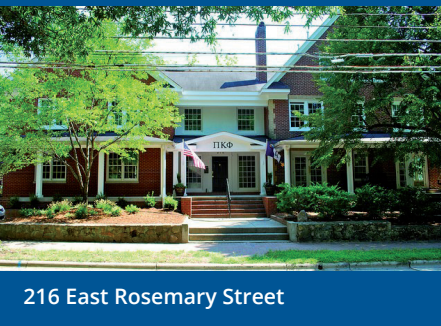

Kappa Council Annual Meeting

On January 21, 2023, the Kappa Council held its annual meeting with the Kappa Chapter. The meeting started with former Archon Tyler Beckner discussing many of the chapter's achievements in the prior year. One of these, not already mentioned in the newsletter, was that our chapter has more Ability Experience participants last summer than any other individual chapter.

Next the former Treasurer, Shane Purner, and current Treasurer, Alex Jones, gave a financial report of the chapter. Some of the key points from this report include that all rent will now be paid upfront at the start of the semester, the chapter's shift to "LegFi" as their financial software, and the development of a brand-new Reserve Account (Rainy Day Fund) being built into the budget.

Following the fiscal report, new Archon Cole Bright spoke about his goals for the upcoming year along with his new Bright Bucks system to encourage chapter involvement.

Next up came updates directly from Kappa Council. New bylaws were approved to update the previously 60-year-old bylaws, with a major change being that all alumni are granted a lifelong Kappa Council membership. For alumni requesting the complete written bylaws, please email us.

Kappa Council Treasurer Steve Shaw provided his fiscal report, with the key point being that the mortgage of the Chapter House is on pace to be paid off within 2 years.

After the report, Kappa Council Communications Director Mike Collins and Chapter Historian Andrew Davis provided a joint report on website updates, and further plans to improve alumni-chapter communication.

The meeting concluded with the announcement of Trey Bright, Tom Stevens, Steven Stephenson, and Harrison Locklear as four new Kappa Council Directors along with special recognition being provided to chapter legacies and Kappa Council Directors Mike Collins, Steve Shaw, and Marty Lindsey for their years of service.

Originally from Albemarle, Jeff's career focus has been sustainability work; helping communities, counties, and the state find ways to maintain and preserve resources.

Jeff lives in Davidson with his wife, Autumn, and children; Boone, a high school senior; Della Scott, a high school sophomore; Mary Kirk, a high school freshman; and Sarah Frances, a 6th-grader.

He said, "I joined a fraternity because I saw it as part of the college experience." Why Pi Kapp? "I knew Tim Ogburn from Governor's School and Doug Connell was from Albemarle. The thing about Pi Kapp was that it felt like home. It was different from other fraternities. Not trashy, we were comfortable lying on the carpet in the parlor. Miss Grace was great! When you are away from home and exploring a new side of yourself, you should explore new things, but have some stability. There was a sense of belonging."

What did you learn? "The fraternity was a laboratory for life. I was Archon my senior year and we handled budget, finances, payroll, and it was a bunch of 19-20-21 year-olds being able to do that. We were able to learn and use skills we've now used all our lives."

Marty Lindsey '84

Marty Lindsey has owned a State Farm Insurance agency in Durham for over 30 years.



A board member of Kappa Council, Marty was born and raised in Durham. He and his wife, AraLu, live on Battle Lane in Chapel Hill in the historic Graham House, considered part of the University's campus. The house was built in 1908 for Edward Kidder Graham, a UNC alumnus who taught the University's first journalism course and was UNC President from 1914 to 1918 when he died of the flu.

Marty has been an outstanding resource for Kappa Council. His proximity to the fraternity house at 216 East Rosemary has allowed him to keep watch over the house and serve as a valued advisor. He said, "When we decided to have a house on campus I decided to get back involved with Kappa Council and the chapter.

"I was the only freshman pledge in '80," Marty said, "And I lived in the house throughout my Carolina years. So, when I graduated, I only knew Pi Kapps. Even today, many of my best friends are Pi Kapps."

Marty and AraLu were introduced by Steve Shaw, '82, then Lindsey's roommate, and his wife, Renee, when all four were undergraduates. The Lindseys have two sons; Will, '14; and Sam, '16. Both sons were Phi Deltas.

What did you learn? "My experience in the fraternity taught me that there are a lot of different kinds of people in the world," he said. "I worked in the kitchen for Grace for two years and she had a number of assistants. So, between

my roommates, fraternity brothers, and work experience I had to learn to work and live with all those different kinds of people. It has been invaluable."

Steve Shaw '82

Steve Shaw has been Treasurer of Kappa Council since 2014.



Originally from High Point, Steve has been at UNC's General Alumni Association since 2001, where he currently serves as Vice President and CFO.

Carolina Blue and Pi Kapp runs deep in Steve's family. His wife, Renee, was Rose Queen in fall '82, the same semester he was Archon. His twin children Austin and Amanda graduated from UNC in 2013, and Austin is a legacy Pi Kapp.

Why join a fraternity? "Pi Kapp is only place I rushed," Steve said. "I really felt comfortable. Honestly, I didn't know what I wanted, but I do know the experience exceeded my expectations. One of the most wonderful things was Miss Grace. She was so special and a common thread for so many of us. She was my mother away from home."

What did he learn in the fraternity? He said, "Leadership; I could learn by observing others in terms of what to do and what not to do."

Steve noted that getting involved in Kappa Council brought another important lesson back to him. He added, "It has reminded me of the lifetime connections we have. My fraternity relationships definitely played a role in my career and job opportunities."

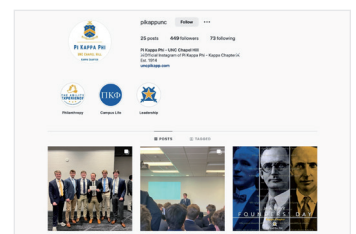
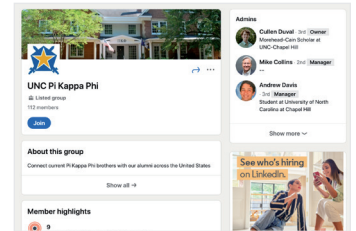
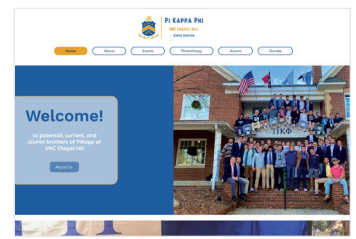

KAPPA COUNCIL REPORT

Stuart Hicks '78

President, Kappa Council

Fellow Pi Kapps,

As the new President of Kappa Council, I appreciate the opportunity to provide an update for you, as we had a busy Fall semester!

Kappa Chapter attained the #1 ranking among all Pi Kappa Phi chapters in the country last year with a 3.5 average GPA, and we have now learned our average increased during the fall semester! We remain second on campus among fraternities behind Chi Psi.

The recent spring rush was wonderfully successful with 16 associates accepting bids. This brings our total brotherhood size to 100, one of the campus' largest, and the first time in quite a while that we've attained that level.

Elsewhere in *216*, you will see details about a terrific group of accomplished individual students.

However, we also experienced three stumbles in Fall '22:

- First, an alcohol incident attracted unwanted local television coverage, and was later reviewed through the university standards apparatus and dismissed.
- Second, reports of Member Education infractions rocked the chapter and brought a temporary suspension by the National Fraternity (later withdrawn). A recent UNC Honors Court hearing resulted in a two semester social probation.
- Third, the overhang of uncertainty created by the first two missteps led many individual students to fall significantly behind in paying their bills. Thanks to an aggressive and successful 10-week effort to hold one another accountable and collect monies due, continued financial weakness has been contained. Serious discussions have been held among the undergraduates and between the Chapter and Kappa Council about each of these 3 missteps, and agreement reached that lessons must be learned and course corrections made.

Meanwhile, our team of existing Board Directors (Marty Lindsey '84, Steve Shaw '82, and Mike Collins '74) have been quite supportive to transition me as the new President and to address ongoing Kappa Council responsibilities. We recognize and appreciate Mick Charles' efforts as the preceding President!

The Board has undertaken significant steps to refresh and modernize Kappa Council operations. A first step was updating our operating Bylaws which, while nostalgic as created over 60 years ago by stalwarts such as Henry Harper and Charlie Hazlehurst, were due for change.

Most significantly, the Board has reconsidered the purpose of Kappa Council relative to 21st-century student needs and university environment, and broadened our approach beyond house ownership, somewhat guided by events of the Fall semester. We envision a more integrated Kappa experience for alumni, parents, and undergraduates.

This repurposing has begun to take place. The Kappa Council Board has been expanded to 8 directors now (with a maximum of 11) to bring insights and skills from a larger team—new Board Directors include Tom Stevens '79, Steve Stephenson '79, plus younger perspectives offered from Trey Bright '16 and Harrison Locklear '22!

Designated roles by Board Directors will support responsible Member Education, Risk Management and Treasury practices by the chapter, one-on-one mentoring with chapter leaders, and reimaged Alumni Engagement and Property Management functions as well.

For example, the Board has retained professional third-party property management services to upgrade the chapter house from its current unsatisfactory condition, and is establishing a multi-year asset management plan and routine preventative maintenance efforts.

Finally, in January, over 35 alumni and most of our active chapter members participated (in-person and virtually) in a formal Annual Meeting of Kappa Council, with transparent reporting about chapter and Kappa Council operations and treasury. These are early steps, but we are convinced long-term benefits will be felt and seen.

The experience of Pi Kappa Phi builds life-long friendships and offers continued learning opportunities for both our undergraduates and alumni. We are committed to stand together as we continue our journey of almost 110 years at UNC–Chapel Hill! We have confidence in the young men with whom we are building Kappa's future, and invite your inquiries about how to become engaged in the process!

Thank you all for your investment into our chapter as we continue to improve and develop in this upcoming year.



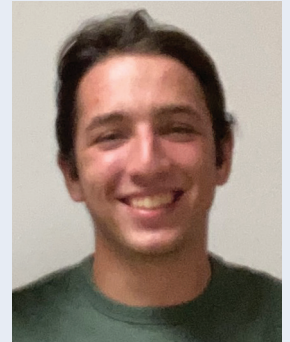
