Many of you were kind to step up, and we did our best. However, the chapter surrendered its charter the next year, and we think returning the money is the right thing to do. The closure of a chapter is never an easy thing, but with the long-term interests of Kappa Chapter in mind, we felt this was the best course of action to take.

Also relating to 216... The university is refurbishing the house, and we understand the offices for the baseball program will be there until the Boshamer Stadium remodeling program is completed in 2008.

Finally, Kappa Council, Inc. is working with the national fraternity to schedule the recolonization of the student chapter. Currently, the re-colonization is scheduled for 2009. We will keep you updated as those details develop.

ALUMNUS SPOTLIGHT: PREISS STILL SEEING AND DOING IT ALL

Kirk Preiss, 57, has no desire to slow down. Recently, the bungee-jumping grandfather and real estate expert caught up with Kappa Council to talk about life and fraternity.
