We look forward to the Outing becoming a strong Kappa tradition.






## **House Improvements**

## Collins Receives The Order of the Long Leaf Pine

Earlier this year, Mike Collins ('74) was honored with The Order of the Long Leaf Pine award from North Carolina Governor Roy Cooper. The Order is presented to individuals who have made significant contributions to the state and their communities through their exemplary service and exceptional accomplishments. It is the highest award that can be presented by the Governor of North Carolina.

For over 37 years, Mike has been a presenter for the NC Community Colleges Small Business Center Network. He has conducted over 3,000 seminars and webinars, providing individuals with practical work and life tips and strategies for getting more done, communicating more effectively, and staying organized in a rapidly changing workplace and world. He has spoken multiple times at all 58 community colleges in North Carolina.



Mike is a native of Lumberton, NC. Following his time at UNC, he went on to receive his masters degree from Duke and study at NC State's nationally-ranked Adult Education Department and Oxford University. He has served over 20 years on Kappa Council, including 10 as president. We are thrilled that Mike received this recognition for his lifetime of service and want to extend him a strong congratulations from both the chapter and Kappa Council.



## **Alumni Legacies**

Kappa Chapter is fortunate to have a number of legacies, sons who followed their fathers into Pi Kappa Phi.

Clay Burns ('02) (UNC MAC '03) and his brother Chris Burns ('06) followed their father Robert Burns ('74).

Steve Shaw ('83) set a great example for his son Austin Shaw (Morehead-Cain Scholar '13).

Trey Bright ('16) (UNC JD '19) and Cole Bright ('24) served as Archons, as did their father Sam Bright ('87) (UNC DDS '91). Trey and Cole participated in The Journey of Hope, Pi Kappa Phi's philanthropy bike ride across America supporting people with disabilities, and Trey currently serves on Kappa Council.

Clay and Chris Burns and Steve Shaw lived at 216 Finley Road and Austin, Trey, and Cole lived at 216 East Rosemary Street.

The fathers certainly served as positive examples for their sons and continue to do so. In addition to serving as Archon as a student, Sam Bright was housefather at Finley Road while in dental school and currently serves on the UNC Board of Visitors. He has a dental practice in Fayetteville.

Steve Shaw was Archon as a senior and served as Pledge Warden and Chairman of the Burnout Committee for the spring semester Burnout event. His wife Renee' was Rose Queen. Shaw is vice president and chief financial officer of Carolina Alumni, the General Alumni Association.

As a student, Robert Burns was Treasurer for two years and, as an alum, served on Kappa Council. He is retired and living in Shelby.

None of the fathers said they encouraged their sons to join a fraternity nor, when they showed interest, to focus on Pi Kappa Phi.

Robert Burns said, "They did it on their own and they chose Pi Kappa Phi on their own." Sam Bright agreed, "Both boys knew that education was the priority for us, but they also thought the fraternity was a cool thing to do.

But, I never pushed Pi Kappa Phi; it was their decision." Steve Shaw added, "I didn't know if he wanted to go that route or not, I wanted him to make up his own mind. He knew how much the fraternity had meant to me, though."

When asked what they gained from their experiences in Kappa Chapter, the sons echoed their fathers: the key benefits were relationships, decision-making skills, and leadership experiences.

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#### **Alumni Legacies**

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Chris Burns spoke for the group when he said, "The thing that has been most beneficial has been that, while we had people similar to me, we had people that were different races, different backgrounds, and different attitudes about life. And, we learned to not only communicate, but to establish really positive relationships, brotherhoods, life-long relationships with [them]."

Cole Bright learned as Archon that, "When you see a green light—people agreeing about something—it just means the light is on, not confirming that what needs to get done will get done. It was a wonderful opportunity to learn and use leadership skills, to set goals and reach them, within a really diverse group of people."

Steve Shaw summed it up when he said, "I'm just really pleased that Austin can have the feeling, as I do, that you may go a long time not seeing brothers and then, when you do, you automatically connect. Those years seem to have flown by and the brotherhood is still there. It's great knowing our sons can have that same experience."

#### WHAT I'VE LEARNED

## Trey Bright ('16) (UNC JD '19)

When contacted for the Alumni Legacies article, Trey Bright was in Italy on his honeymoon. When asked what he learned in Pi Kappa Phi that he uses in life, this was his answer by email:

"That's a tougher question than you may think ... there are so many things that I learned during my time in PKP (as an undergraduate) that I use in life daily ... I stipulate 'as an undergraduate' because it truly is a life-long brotherhood ... from the time that I began pledging PKP until now, I can count on one hand the number of days that have come and gone without hearing from one of my fraternity brothers—and it took several years before there was anything to count at all ... maybe that's the first thing I learned ... the power of fostering 'true, unconditional connections with a variety of men across different backgrounds.

Like most college freshmen, when I stepped on campus I had so much to learn, but it wasn't long until I had a great number of older brothers to turn to for advice, mentorship or just a good laugh ... this was particularly valuable given the successes that so many of the upper-classmen shared ... from student body president to Morehead Cain scholars to highly sought after soon to be young professionals on Wall Street and the like, I suddenly had a common connection with a Rolodex of mentors that I'd have been hard pressed to connect with otherwise ... I quickly learned there were more paths to success than I could have imagined when I turned my tassel in high school and there was no shortage of brothers genuinely willing to help me get there ... what's truly amazing is that the list of 'successes and successful brothers/ connections/mentors' has grown exponentially over the years ... I am consistently blown away to see what nearly each brother of PKP Kappa Chapter has become—from doctors to lawyers to international musicians to high powered investment bankers, hedge fund analysts and entrepreneurs, there is no shortage of PKP Kappa Chapter men that I know I could turn to in a time of need.

Just two years after joining PKP, I was a part of PKP's flagship philanthropy program, the Journey of Hope ... a philanthropy bike ride where PKPs across the country gather to raise money and awareness for people with disabilities as we cycle from the West Coast of the United States to Washington, DC ... each day on the bike in the summer heat (quite literally through mountains and deserts, and at times in the face of roaring headwinds) was a challenge, but seeing the smiles on the faces of those with disabilities as we cycled up to what were appropriately called 'friendship visits' made it all worth it ... the connections I made on our friendship visits put so much into perspective—my silly bike ride, or now my silly tough day at work, pales in comparison to the challenges that the friends that I made across the country on that trip face each and every day with smiles on their faces."

#### **NOTABLE ALUMNI**

## Governor Dan K. Moore

In the 110-year history of Kappa Chapter, we have had a wide range of outstanding business leaders, physicians, academics, and ministers; we have had only one governor.

Initiated on February 24, 1925, **Daniel Killian Moore** (April 2, 1906–September 7, 1986) was the 66th governor of North Carolina from 1965 to 1969.

Moore was born in Asheville on April 2, 1906. His father was a superior court judge and died when Moore was two years old.

Moore completed a bachelor's degree in commerce in 1927 and was selected to Phi Beta Kappa. He earned a law degree from Carolina in 1929.

Upon graduation, Moore practiced law in Sylva, NC, and served a term in the North Carolina House of Representatives in 1941 before entering the U.S. Army in 1943. While in the army, he served in the medical and judge advocate departments, with 13 months of service in the Europe; he was discharged in October 1945.

After the war, Moore stepped back into service for the state by serving as a North Carolina Superior Court judge from 1948 to 1958. He then served as counsel for the Champion Papers company in Canton, NC, while a member of the state Board of Water Resources.

In 1964, Dan Moore left Champion to run for governor and was seen as a moderate candidate in the primary between conservative I. Beverly Lake and progressive L. Richardson Pryer. Moore won a primary runoff with Preyer and won the general election over Robert L. Gavin with 59.56% of the vote. He was sworn in on January 8, 1965.

After serving one term as governor (North Carolina governors were not then eligible to be reelected), Moore's successor, Governor Bob Scott, appointed him to the North Carolina Supreme Court, the first governor of North Carolina to be so honored. He served on the Court from November 20, 1969 until December 31, 1978. As a judge and justice, he was noted for the breadth of his legal experience, common sense, and compassion.

At the 1968 Democratic National Convention, Moore received 17½ votes for president on the first ballot, finishing fifth behind Vice President Hubert Humphrey, Sen. Eugene McCarthy, Sen. George McGovern, and Rev. Channing E. Phillips.

Moore died on September 7, 1986. The previous May, a section of Interstate 40 was named after him.

The governor at the time, Gov. James G. Martin, said, "The passing of Dan K. Moore is a sad loss to North Carolina. Mrs. Martin and I have lost a good friend. He and his dear wife, Jeanelle, have been an inspirational example to us in so many ways. His firm and steady leadership and his many years of service as governor and judge have been a blessing to the people of the state. We will miss him."

Former Gov. Jim Hunt said, "His accomplishments in judicial excellence, economic development and programs for youth are of a poorer state with the passing of this decent and civilized leader."

Susie Sharp, the chief justice when Moore served as a Supreme Court Justice, stated, "He is one of the finest people I ever knew. Dan was a very steady person. You couldn't stampede him. That was even so in law school."

## **KAPPA COUNCIL REPORT**

Fellow Pi Kapps,

As another year at UNC and Kappa Chapter concludes, we provide an update below.

You may have seen the significant national attention our fraternity and others received in May when numerous Greek men, including the Kappa Chapter, were pictured holding up the American flag to allow it to be raised back to its appropriate place in the Quad during protests. We received overwhelmingly positive feedback from alumni and parents during this time, expressing great pride in the patriotism displayed by the young men that day. We continue to work with our National Fraternity to resolve the significant GoFundMe monies raised, not by Pi Kappa Phi, but by those who sought to recognize the fraternity chapters engaged that day.

Within our normal activity, we initiated 18 new members after the Fall semester and 13 new members in the Spring. After graduating 27 members this Spring, our net chapter size returning in August is 74 before Fall Rush. It is commendable that Kappa is one of the largest and most actively engaged fraternities on campus.

Our chapter has greatly improved in managing its Accounts Receivable, with minimal balances this Spring. This is a testament to strong student leadership and overall individual accountability.

Our two-semester social probation (from Member Education infractions) is now in the rearview mirror, completing this

in December. A refreshed wave of enthusiasm is sweeping through the chapter.

Needed improvements to the chapter house will continue this summer, including rear yard water drainage improvements, basement moisture elimination, and kitchen flooring replacement.



Our Treasurer, Steve Shaw,

manages a strong balance sheet, with \$185,000 in cash and \$197,000 in remaining first mortgage debt. However, continued improvement requirements for the chapter house will make it unlikely to achieve positive cash flow in 2024.

Our Alumni Engagement chair, Tom Stevens, organized an Alumni Golf Outing on May 21 at the newly renovated Finley Golf Course. For the 43rd consecutive year in June, 30+ alumni will convene in Pinehurst for a weekend of golf and fellowship (The Freeman Classic, in honor of a lost Brother). Please mark your calendar for an Alumni Reunion at the Chapter House on October 5, 2024, before the UNC-Pitt football game. We are trying to arrange tickets for those interested—please contact Tom Stevens at tjstevens509@gmail.com if you might join us!

We continue to have confidence in the young men with whom we are building Kappa's future, and we invite your inquiries about how to become engaged in the process!
